## Whitchurch Silk Mill - Tuesday 21st May 2024

Do you know your warp from your weft? This was one of the fascinating things we learnt when we visited Whitchurch Silk Mill, a charming mill on the river Test in Hampshire. Our visit started with coffee and biscuits and in two groups we set off taking very great care walking across the uneven beam floor of this ancient silk mill. The mill was built in the early part of the 19th century and after several changes of ownership remained in one family until the 1980s when it became a charitable trust. It is still a working silk mill producing exquisite designs for television and film productions. In fact, one of the many highlights of the visit was seeing fashion designer Zandra Rhodes meeting with the silk weaver (see photo). I say the silk weaver as it is a dying craft and there are only 5 fully gualified silk weavers in the country. We learnt that the silkworm is one of the hungriest creatures on the planet devouring a shedload of mulberry leaves everyday producing 12 miles of silk thread from its cocoon. From this beginning the silk thread is spun and dyed and then woven into exclusive fabrics. There was so much to take in and everyone had a wonderful day. ### **HISTORICAL NEWS**

In the April 2024 edition of the LIRC News, we included an article about the volcanic island of Iceland which appeared in the 20 June 1973 edition of **IBM UK News**. We have found another article in the same edition which we hope you will also enjoy reading, especially as it relates to the good relationship that IBM and the USA had with the Soviet Union in the 1970's (which is in stark contrast to the relationship that the UK and USA have today with Russia).

### Soviet delegates visit IBM

A Soviet delegation of eight leading government officials, computer, and science experts visited America recently, spending seven days at IBM facilities as part of a larger, 23-day tour of US computer manufacturers the Soviets had arranged for themselves. Their mission was to build some bridges of understanding that will cement trading links between the two countries. US computer manufacturers including IBM, displayed their computer and office equipment wares at a 12-day Leningrad Fair last October. The Soviets expressed great interest in virtually every item on the floor. One product ordered by the Soviets for use in the Ministry of Chemistry - an IBM System 360 Model 50 - has now been approved for sale by the US Government after a lengthy review procedure. Final approval of the order was given recently by COCOM, NATO's coordinating committee. It marks IBM's official entry into the expanding and competitive USSR data processing market.
